1. Call To Order

Tom Tonkavich called the meeting to order at 1:03 pm.

2. Future Meeting Dates and Times (All)

Mr. Tonkavich open the floor for suggestions on dates and times for future committee meetings. After various comments, the Committee agreed to meet bi-weekly on the 1st and 3rd Fridays of each month, with the exception of December. The Committee will meet at 1:00pm in Alachua County Community Support Services' Conference Room. Future meetings will occur on December 6, January 3, January 17, February 7 and February 21. Additional meeting dates will be announced as needed in the future.

3. Sunshine and Ethics (Alachua County Attorney's Office)

Attorney Corbin Hanson gave a presentation entitled "Government in the Sunshine 101...for Advisory Committees." He presented various information, including the Sunshine legislation, basic tenants and requirements, voting conflicts and interests and resources for Committee members.

4. Elect/Designate a Committee Chair/Spokesperson

Mr. Tonkavich explained the importance of having a Committee Chair/Spokesperson and opened the floor for nominations. The Committee unanimously selected Dr. Herman Knopf to serve as the Committee's Chair/Spokesperson.

5. List of Reports to Review

Dr. Knopf presented an overview of how the Technical Advisory Committee was formed and its purpose, particularly concerning the Trust's desire for an updated comprehensive needs assessment. This Committee will evaluate most of the needs assessments that are publicly available and use other resources to create a guide that the Trust is able to use for future funding initiatives. Dr. Knopf briefly identified the needs assessments he was familiar with, including the Child Wellbeing Indicators Report (Children's Services Advisory Board), Florida Child Wellbeing Index (University of South Florida), Alachua County Children's Services Needs Assessment (WellFlorida), Florida Children Services Array Report (University of South Florida), Research Statement

(BOOST Alliance Project), Intersection Between Mental Health and the Juvenile Justice System and Understanding Racial Inequity in Alachua County (University of Florida).

The floor then opened for further discussion, with many attendees suggesting additional Needs Assessments available for the Committee's use. These suggestions include: Dental Needs of the Children's Alachua County (University of Florida); various community foundations that have grant-funded projects (focusing on trauma, school-based surveys, Meridian, Child Advocacy Center); Children's Health Insurance Program Needs Assessment (Alachua County Health Department); Children's Report Card (Dr. Nancy Hardt); University of Florida Health's Data Report/Community Health Needs Assessment; Florida CHARTS; Robert Wood Johnson Foundation County Health Rankings and Roadmaps (University of Wisconsin).

After further discussion on Needs Assessments, the Committee agreed to continue this discussion at the next meeting.

**Children's Trust of Alachua County
Annual Report FY2019 Pursuant to 125.901 Florida Statute**

The Children's Trust of Alachua County has been established pursuant to Section 125.901 Florida Statute and Alachua County Ordinance 18-08, as approved by the voters in November 2018 and its purpose is set forth by statute and ordinance. Over 61% of the Alachua County voters approved the creation of the Trust. The purpose of the Children's Trust of Alachua County is to provide children's services throughout Alachua County.

The powers and authority of the Children's Trust of Alachua County includes:

1. To provide and maintain within the County such preventive, developmental, treatment, and rehabilitative services for children as the council determines are needed for the general welfare of the County.
2. To provide such other services for all children as the council determines are needed for the general welfare of the County.
3. To allocate and provide funds for other agencies in the County which are operated for the benefit of children, provided they are not under the exclusive jurisdiction of the public school system.
4. To collect information and statistical data which will be helpful to the council in deciding the needs of children in the County.
5. To consult with other agencies dedicated to the welfare of children to the end that the overlapping of services will be prevented.
6. To lease or buy such real estate, equipment, and personal property and to construct such buildings as are needed to execute the foregoing powers and functions, provided that no such purchases shall be made or building done except for cash with funds on hand or secured by funds deposited in financial institutions.
7. To employ and pay, on a part-time or full-time basis, personnel needed to execute the foregoing powers and functions.
8. To enter into agreements with government agencies to provide administrative services.
9. All powers, functions, and duties specified in Section 125.901, Florida Statutes.

The Children’s Trust of Alachua County held their inaugural meeting on March 11, 2019. During the fiscal year, they held thirteen meetings that were well-attended by nominees and public alike.

Trust Members and Nominees have been informed of ethics requirements and Sunshine Laws, approved by-laws and appointed interim officers pending appointment of the remaining members by the Governor. Commissioner Ken Cornell serves as the Interim Chair, Judge Susanne Wilson-Bullard as the Interim Vice-Chair and Member Tina Certain as the Interim Treasurer. The Trust designated the Alachua County Attorney as the Registered Agent and Registered Office with Tom Tonkavich as their Records Custodian. The Trust was provided with the Gap Analysis created by the Children’s Services Advisory Board to identify needs of youth along with the initial needs assessment on the prenatal to age five population. They also received preliminary research information on a System-Wide Care for Alachua County Youth. With this as a basis to proceed, the Trust included funding for a comprehensive needs assessment in their first year budget.

The Trust members also invited directors from other like-size Children’s Services Councils to present to them on staffing, administration and related organizational matters. They approved joining the Florida Children’s Council and benefited from significant information shared in response to questions throughout the year.

The Trust approved their FY2020 budget totaling \$6,802,594 and millage of 0.50 and submitted this to the Alachua County Board of County Commissioners on June 17, 2019. As part of this budget, the Trust approved an Interlocal agreement for administrative services with the Clerk of the Court for the Eighth Judicial Circuit and the Alachua County Board of County Commissioners. The Trust also approved funding for three contracts with providers of services for the prenatal to five population and developed a Request for Proposals for services to those aged 6 to 18 and to address capital needs. The Trust has begun a search for an Executive Director with a goal of hiring by January 2020.

The Trust held two Public Hearings – September 10, 2019 and September 16, 2019 to present and adopt their budget.

Information on the effectiveness of activities, services, and programs offered by the Children’s Trust of Alachua County along with a description of the goals, objectives, procedures, performance outcomes will be addressed in future annual reports. This past year was spent forming the Trust and preparing for service implementation. No funding was available to initiate services during this reporting time period.

Opportunity Agenda: Improved Policies, Systems and Practices for Families with Young Children in Poverty

Research is clear that poverty is the single greatest threat to children's development and overall well-being. Poverty greatly impedes children's ability to learn and contributes to social, emotional, and behavioral problems. Poverty also can contribute to poor physical and mental health. In Florida, nearly a million children, age 18 and younger, live in poverty. The economic stabilization and path to self-sufficiency for families is directly linked to children's development.

While accessing social services can provide needed financial supports for households, in many instances income eligibility requirements force parents to choose between wage increases and the critical needs of their children, such as children's health insurance and child care. Current Florida and federal policies have created structural barriers for families with young children in poverty to achieve economic self-sufficiency. As family income increases, often families lose eligibility to services that have direct impact on their children's development.

Aligning social services with intentionality to better support positive outcomes for children and families in tandem is referred to as two-generational strategies, or "2gen." Research has shown that the future achievement of children in poverty is directly related to the length of time they live in poverty. Therefore, there is need for more effective policy solutions that would strengthen supports and resources for children and families in poverty through the integration of work-based strategies with services that support children's development. **If done right, these strategies can effectively support families as they transition to economic self-sufficiency by easing the fiscal cliff that prohibits increases in wages without creating a risk that children's development will be compromised.** The 2gen approach provides a framework for reducing government dependency and spending, while improving the outcomes of children and families.

Potential Opportunities and Considerations for Advancing a 2Gen Opportunity Agenda

The following concepts outline strategies for discussion and exploration. For each, work and resulting analysis would support the: 1) identification of potential policy changes for social services that could increase economic security for families with young children in poverty; and 2) development of strategies to assure the most appropriate use of social services investments that expedite upward mobility and reduce long-term government dependency for families in poverty.

Revising School Readiness Definitions on the Calculation of Income for Eligibility

The federal law caps the eligibility for child care subsidy (School Readiness) at 85% of State Median Income (SMI). States have the discretion for determining how income for eligibility is calculated. Currently in Florida statute 1002.81, the definitions for earned income, family income, and unearned

income that in combination determine eligibility, are prescribed in law. These definitions include intangible cash assets such as retirement, as well as other assets like veteran's benefits that may unnecessarily limit eligibility for low-income working families with young children. Revising the law to remove the definitions from statute and granting the Office of Early Learning rulemaking authority would:

- Allow for greater flexibility in how Florida defines income for determining eligibility for School Readiness;
- Prompt analysis on the impact of income factors that currently create restrictions and barriers to eligibility or continuing services for families before attaining sufficient income to pay the full cost of child care; and
- Enable variances and waivers under certain approved circumstances if communities determine the need for exceptions to the state rule.

Align Child Care Subsidy and Workforce Development Policies and Services

States have the discretion for setting the initial income eligibility for the child care subsidy program. Currently in state law, Florida requires that a family's income must be at or below 150% FPL and they must be working or in school for a minimum of 20 hours per week for initial eligibility. Many low-income working families that are receiving support from the workforce system (CareerSource) are placed into jobs that are above the initial income eligibility threshold, but below a level sufficient to afford child care. This can greatly compromise their ability to maintain employment. Revising current child care subsidy and workforce development statutes to better align policies can increase the opportunity for families to be economically self-sufficient and improve kindergarten readiness for children at risk of school failure:

- Amend the current statute s. 445.09(8)(a), F.S. to provide greater flexibility for the use of Individual Training Accounts for work-based training programs to increase the ability of low-income working families to access critical supports, services, and resources that support increased self-sufficiency; and
- Amend the initial eligibility for School Readiness from 150% FPL to 200% FPL for parents with CareerSource Individual Training Accounts.

Federal Resolution to Increase School Readiness Eligibility Beyond 85% SMI

In 2014, the Child Care Development Fund was reauthorized and federal regulations were changed to provide eligibility for families to access child care subsidy up to 85% of State Median Income (SMI). Once a family is at or above 85% of SMI, they are no longer eligible to receive a child care subsidy and services are terminated. The United Way of Florida ALICE Report documented that in nearly every county in Florida child care is more expensive than housing. It is the single greatest household budget item and the expense of child care remains largely unaffordable for families at 85% of SMI. A federal resolution would:

- Include analysis of the costs of child care against the costs of a typical household budget at 85% SMI;
- Include a recommended graduated phase-out payment model that increases the family co-pay as their income increases, but provides lessening levels of child care subsidy to mitigate the benefits cliff; and
- Request additional flexibility for states to implement policies that are most likely to improve economic self-sufficiency and reduce government dependence.

Creation of a Child Care Savings Account

As parents with young children in poverty increase wages and approach the benefits cliff, very often difficult decisions must be made between taking a promotion or new job with increased wages, or 'parking' just below the eligibility threshold to avoid losing access to the child care subsidy. Current eligibility restrictions can be an impediment and unintentional disincentive for career advancement. Creating a Child Care Savings Account plan in Florida statute would allow low-income working families approaching the benefits cliff to defer income into a savings account without it being included in the calculation of income for eligibility. A threshold for how much money can be contributed annually, as well as lifetime would be established. This would enable families to save sufficient funds to pay for child care and mitigate the benefits cliff. The Achieving a Better Life Experience Act and state plan can serve as a blueprint for how this can be established. A Child Care Savings Account would:

- Allow families to save money to pay for child care and afterschool care needs without losing access to the child care subsidy; and
- Incentivize families to continue wage progressions without making difficult choices between career and the needs of their young children.

Audit on the Practices of Intake and Consumer Education for Social Services

Families understanding of social services, as well as their ability to navigate multiple programs and services housed within differing state agencies can directly impact the efficacy of programs designed to increase economic self-sufficiency and improve child outcomes. Determining the sufficiency of current eligibility and enrollment practices and readability of collateral materials designed for consumer education and enrollment would provide important analysis on whether adjustments to policy and practices are needed for consumer education and effective case management. An audit on the practices of intake and consumer education for social services would inform whether or not:

- Needed services are actually being provided;
- Services that are being funded are actually being provided as they were intended to be;
- Services are provided to those intended and most in need;
- Case management is effective across social services;
- Consumer education is readily available and understandable; and

- Current monitoring protocols for enrollment and consumer education are in place.

Streamlining Access to Services for Families

A comprehensive review of services across agencies and entities would support the identification of current system assets and unintentional barriers to create efficiencies in policy and practice that ease administrative workflow and increase access to services for families with young children. One strategy for mitigating the challenges of navigating the multitude of services for families with young children is to streamline the application process and align the intake of information for eligibility. Developing more complete, digestible information accessible online for families also allows families to be more efficiently educated on relevant programs and makes services more accessible and targeted. These processes in combination also enable better matching of family needs with eligibility and available services. Through a process of determining opportunities to streamline eligibility and application protocols, there is also considerable potential to create efficiencies and long-term cost savings for the state. This can be accomplished by:

- Identifying all relevant social service programs for families with young children and create an inventory of these programs and eligibility requirements.
- Determining opportunities for streamlining eligibility requirements and application processes that simplify intake and eligibility determination procedures.

Attached you will find a list of bills being tracked by Carol Bracy. Carol provides this regularly during session and I will forward to this group to assist with any tracking you may be doing locally. All the bills listed impact children in some way. Not all align with our priorities, but all will continue to be tracked and likely included in Capitol Connection.

Jenny and I are meeting early next week to start working on Capitol Connection. This will be the most labor intensive part of the process and will require us to write short summary statements about each bill. As you know, some of the descriptions for these bills are a page long or longer, so getting them down to a few sentences is always fun. If you have the bandwidth to assist with this "creative writing" task, we are happy to send you a few of the easier ones. Once we have the descriptions complete (this will continue through the first week of session) we will load them into Capitol Connection and start tracking. We intend to provide Capitol Connection to all members with your branding on it if you'd like to distribute to your partners locally. More to come.

If you have not seen it already, here is a link to the Governor's proposed budget <http://www.bolderbrighterbetterfuture.com/HomeFY21.htm>. The general consensus is that it's pretty good, especially for our issues. However, as we all know, this is simply a recommendation and the legislature will ultimately develop the budget and send to the Governor for approval. We will see how it shakes out. One final note about this session, it's an election year and that could motivate the legislature to act quickly on all issues.

Please let me know if there are any local issues that you need our assistance with. We are focused on the approved policy platform but are happy to help in any way we can. I will send regular updates to this group throughout session. As always, please feel free to call me any time if you have questions.
